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Important Things to Remember:

1. **New Experiences:** *The first few weeks/months that you have your puppy is when they need to be socialized the most. Please take your puppy on car rides and expose them to as many people, noises, and new experiences as possible.*
 - *Even though, you should not let your puppy walk around on the ground in public places until their final 16 week shots, to protect from Parvo (which is transmitted from unvaccinated dogs through their feces and the pads of their feet), **you should still be hand carrying your pup out and about to ensure optimal socialization!***
2. **Whining & Night Time Experiences:** *You may get limited sleep during the first few months as your pup works through his separation from his littermates and holding his bladder through the night. Here are a few helpful solutions, if needed:*
 - *Tether your pup by your bed. Use a solid thick or leather leash, and tie him right by your bed at night. That way you can reach over to easily soothe him with your hand or voice as needed.*
 - *Give your puppy a piece of your dirty laundry to sleep with.*
 - *Give your puppy a warm rubber hot water bottle to sleep with.*
3. **Puppy Discipline & the 'Fear' Period:** *Your sweet little one WILL have normal puppy behaviors, a chewed up shoe, poop behind the chair, biting during play...*
 - *Please do NOT lose control in anger at your puppy, as it may damage your bond with them and may cause them to suffer submissive peeing throughout their lifetime.*
 - *Use the natural method of grabbing the scruff at the back of their neck and tell them 'no' in a calm, serious voice, then immediately cease interaction with your puppy, turn your back, walk away, or stop playing.*
4. **Remember the Key to a Well Behaved Puppy is Constant SUPERVISION!**
